Dear Resident,

As Chairman of the NSW Liberals & Nationals WasteWatch Committee, I am particularly aware of the billions of dollars in Labor waste and mismanagement revealed during the current parliamentary term. This is now impacting on every household, including through increasing gas and electricity prices.

On 1 July 2010 NSW electricity prices increased by an average of 10% to help fund upgrades to the transmission system, largely made necessary by 15 years of neglect from NSW Labor. At the same time, the Labor Government ripped \$13.8 billion out of electricity companies in dividends and taxes - money that could have been used to upgrade transmission lines, sub-stations and other infrastructure.

The power price increases come on top of a 20% jump in July last year with further average increases forecast of 11% in 2011 and 8% in 2012. The Federal Labor Government's former Emissions

Trading Scheme would have added another 23%, and additional increases are possible to cover State Government imposed administrative costs.

From 1 July 2010 gas prices also increased by around 5% for the majority of small gas customers, but it gets worse. Over the three years to 2013, gas prices are expected to increase by another 12% to 17%. The worst affected, of course, will be those who can least afford such massive price rises - pensioners, self-funded retirees and large families.

The NSW Liberals & Nationals under Barry O'Farrell believe it is time for a fresh approach to managing the state and are working hard to be given that opportunity. I will continue to focus on representing your interests on relevant state-wide issues as well as matters of local concern. Power to the people!

Members of the community, particularly members of The Shed, are undertaking most of the fit-out work following seven years of planning. Well done to all involved!

GLENROSE SHOPS UPDATE

Work is expected to begin shortly on demolishing part of the Glenrose Shopping Centre and remediating contaminated soil. The remediation work is expected to be completed in February 2011.

In the meantime, nine specialty shops and Woolworths supermarket will continue to operate, whilst centre owners (Stockland) develop replacement design options, within the concept approval from Warringah Council.
